Being an Area Governor is one of the best ways to develop your personal leadership skills, as you help others to develop club officer skills. Put your leadership talent to the test by challenging yourself to serve as an Area Governor for the 2007-2008 Toastmaster Year.

What do Area Governors do?

Visits each Club at least twice a year

- Relates the District's Theme to the Club members
- Completes the AG visit form with the Club President
- Presents educational modules
- Becomes a source of information for the Club
- Serves as a club's No. 1 cheerleader for success

Conducts two Area Contests

- Humorous Speech and Table Topics Contest in September
- International Speech and Evaluation Contest on March

Attends Committee meetings

- Attends District Council meetings and District Conferences
- Attends Executive Committee Meetings
- Attends Division Council Meetings
- Hosts Area Council Meetings

Supports District and Division events

- Assists with the Division Contests (generally October and April)
- Assists with Division Responsibilities at District Officer Training
- Assists with Division Responsibilities at District Conferences

What's in it for me?

Required to achieve the Advanced Leader – Silver Award

- Increased opportunities to speak to different audiences
- Opportunity to develop friends for life
- Networking opportunities with corporations, agencies and community leaders

How do I learn to do all this?
